For decades the exact location of the plot had been unknown as the original plaque was attached to a tree and lost to the ages. Due to the diligent research of member Janet Haller, along with the hard work of State Lecturer Dave Roberts, the plot has been identified and a new marker with a beautiful plaque has been placed prominently in the forest.

This part of the Forest was once the King Farm and was purchased through donations of members of the Connecticut State Grange in 1930.

The new plaque was made possible by the generous donations of members and friends of the Grange. All donors will be recognized during the ceremony.

The dedication will begin at 3:30




We thank the members of Riverton Grange (located at 17 Riverton Road/ Rte. 20) in Riverton for offering the use of their hall for the meal.

Everyone who attends will receive a commemorative keychain.



### A renewed focus on Veterans

14<sup>th</sup> Connecticut State Grange Lecturers' Roundup was held on June 29th and brought Grange members from across the state for an inspiring and informative virtual event centered on veterans' initiatives and interorganizational collaboration. Held in a spirit of service and community, the theme focused on strengthening partnerships between local Granges and veterans' organizations. The event's highlight was a keynote discussion led by Tim Sweeney, a dedicated Riverton Grange #169 member and Commander of the Riverton American Legion Post #159.

Dave Roberts began the discussion by sharing that Riverton Grange conducted a Community Needs Assessment over six years ago and discovered a need for veteran initiatives. At that time, the only initiative was an annual Veterans Appreciation Dinner held at Riverton Grange each November, hosted by Lecturer Raine Pedersen. Riverton Grange contacted the Riverton American Legion Post Commander, Tim Sweeney, and a new partnership began.

Tim shared insights into the Riverton Grange's nationally recognized programs that honor and support veterans. Their "Veteran of the Month" and American flag retirement ceremonies have received National Grange acclaim for their heartfelt execution and community impact. These events recognize the sacrifice of local servicemembers and serve as educational and unifying moments for the broader community. This partnership brought Tim and his wife Melissa to Riverton Grange as new members and now as newly elected Riverton Grange officers. "If it weren't for the Grange partnership with veterans," said Tim, "we never would have known about Grange nor become members. And we are so glad we did!"

Riverton Grange's "Veteran of the Month" ceremony has been held for four years and has honored over fifty veterans since its inception. Recently, Riverton Grange was gifted a new solar-lit flag pole for its property to enhance its monthly ceremonies. Riverton Grange recently held its 8th American Flag Retirement Ceremony at a new location in Colebrook, where over two thousand flags were retired in a solemn bonfire ceremony. Since this initiative began, over 9,000 American flags have now been retired respectfully per the US Code. In addition to Riverton Legion American Post #159, Riverton Grange partners with over one-half dozen other community groups on veterans initiatives. Partnering with other like-minded groups has helped Riverton Grange grow and impact the region more.

Tim Sweeney emphasized the emotional significance of these ceremonies, noting that for many veterans and their families. being honored this way is deeply meaningful and often healing. "Every veteran deserves to be remembered, and these ceremonies offer a tangible way to say thank you," he stated. He also shared stories that underscored profound personal impact these recognitions have had on families, some of whom had never seen their loved one's service publicly acknowledged before.

Beyond honoring veterans, Tim highlighted the importance of collaboration between Granges and veteran service organizations. Tim offered practical advice for Granges, who was interested in building these partnerships, suggesting outreach to local American Legion posts, VFW chapters, and other community groups. He guided the initiation of these connections, starting with a simple phone call, attending a veterans' event, or inviting veterans to speak at Grange meetings.

The discussion underscored the shared values between the Grange and veteran organizations: service, community involvement, patriotism, and a commitment uplifting others. Attendees were encouraged to view these collaborations mutually as beneficial relationships that can strengthen both organizations' outreach and impact.

The Roundup served as a platform for education, inspiration, and a call to action. Connecticut State Grange Lecturer Dave Roberts praised the work of these Riverton Grange initiatives and urged Granges across the state to consider implementing similar initiatives. "This is a blueprint for what community service can look like at its best," he noted.

As the session concluded, many attendees expressed a renewed commitment to honoring veterans in their communities and exploring new avenues for partnership. Tim Sweeney's closing message best summarized the spirit of the Roundup: "We can't do everything, but we can all do something. And when we work together, the impact is far greater."

With a renewed focus on veterans and collaboration, the Connecticut State Grange is poised to expand its reach and deepen its role in serving those who have served. The 15th Connecticut State Grange Lecturers' Roundup will be held on Saturday, October 4th, at 7:30 PM. Roundups are virtual and open to all


For many years you have listened to our State Steward, Jaimie Cameron and I talk about how we want to start a book club. We are going to do it this year, starting at Saturday's lunch of State Session this year. The book *True Biz*, by Sara Novic will be the first.

To prepare for lunch with the Youth and Junior Committees, you want to begin by taking a piece of paper or sticky note and answering this question: "How much knowledge did you have about the deaf community and/or ASL before you read *True Biz*?" This is the first questions Novic recommends for reflection and even if you don't read the book it is a good questions to try to answer before you come to lunch. For over 50 years, deaf awareness has been an endeavor of the Grange

and Sign-A-Song has been a Youth/ Junior contest.

True Biz is a coming-of-age story set at a residential school for the deaf, exploring themes of deaf culture, identity, and the experiences of both deaf and hearing individuals. You have listened to me encouraging you and your Granges to get families so we can have a new generation of youth and young adults involved in the Grange. This book has that and what different generations think about one topic. So it is a book for everyone. Sara Novic, its author, is someone not born deaf but someone who grew up hearing and had to learn what it was like to be deaf. She addresses many issues of concern to deaf culture. The book itself lets vou feel ASL or hear it if you listen to it as an audio book.

Before I started writing this, I went online and found 9 used copies of this book that we can circulate around for our members to read before our October meeting. Please contact me at dawnanstett@




gmailcom and I will try and put you in touch with a book. This book is also available on Amazon, Kindle and Audible.

## Legislatively Speaking

We have all heard the following: "Figures can't lie, but liars can figure." Since the last article, Congress has passed the "Big Beautiful Bill" budget for this upcoming year. They say it is full of tax cuts for the middle class, and cuts wasteful spending as found by DOGE. Yet, it's full of cuts to SNAP, Medicare, Farm Aid, Education, Children's programs, Social Security, State aid, and a scale back of FEMA funding.

At this time Elon Musk was leaving the White House after DOGE fired and cut funding for Social Security, VA, and Federal Agencies. The tables were turned as a school drama erupted between Musk and the President.

Mr. Musk rejected claims the "Big Beautiful Bill" was full of pork and would raise the National Debt by 2.6 trillion dollars, urging the Senate vote down the bill. The drama continued to the breaking point that Mr. Musk said that if it wasn't his money buying the election Trump would have lost, and as he was shown the door, the last blow was Mr. Trump is on the Epstein List. June 14 was the 250th birthday of the U.S. Army, and it was also the birthday of the President. A parade was planned for Washington, D.C., a military parade. The last time a military parade was held was following Desert Storm in

1991 to welcome back the troops. The parade was prepared, at a cost of 45 million dollars. It was a cloudy, showering day and the event started at 6:30 P.M. The only media coverage was Fox News. News Nation, Newsmax, and CNN. Attendance was listed as 25,000 people, many empty bleachers, and the troops representing all of the armed forces from the American Revolution, Civil War, Spanish American War, WWI, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm, and new military. All these media outlets provided biased coverage of the event. The troops presented themselves as they do at a Memorial Day parade, not a high-stepping show parade as in North Korea, Russia and China.

June 14 was also the "No King" protest with over 5 million people in all the states gathering to protest the policies and actions of this administration. We need to keep up the protests because if we don't, they will continue.



### TIME SENSITIVE MAIL

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

This is a rerun of a column I first ran in June of 2017. The present refugee situations, both in this country and in many other parts of the world, make it relevant to the times.

"I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

One of the biggest differences between the culture of Biblical times and our modern western culture is in hospitality to strangers. In at least a dozen places, scripture tells us to welcome strangers, and until recently this was a mandate for almost all cultures in the Middle East, whether Muslim, Christian, or Jewish. In Leviticus we read: "The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God". This is reinforced in Deuteronomy, where we are told: "You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt."



A famous example of showing hospitality to strangers is found in the 18th chapter of Genesis, where we find Abraham resting at the entrance to his tent in the heat of the day when he looked up and saw three strangers standing nearby. He instantly ran from his tent to greet them and urged them to join him for something to eat and to drink. Unbeknownst to him these were messengers from God, and they brought blessing upon Abraham and Sarah his wife. But Abraham had no way of knowing that such blessing was forthcoming from his actions. He was merely following the customs of his time and his culture.

Jesus tells us in Matthew: "You

have heard that it was said, 'you shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy'. But I say to you, love your enemy and pray for those who persecute you.." In telling the parable of the Good Samaritan He shows another example of kindness to strangers, even those who might be considered enemies. Jews and Samaritans generally despised each other at this time in history, but the Samaritan in the story showed great kindness, generosity, and brotherly love to the stranger Jew he found robbed and beaten. Paul tells us. in Romans: "Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers." And in the Letter to the Hebrews we read: "Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it."

It is of great sadness to me that we, today, have moved so far away from these ancient Biblical standards of hospitality.
